DECEMBER DINNER MEETING SPOTLIGHT: SOJOURNER'S PLACE **RESTORING HOPE AND STABILITY**

Our final dinner meeting of 2025 was held on December 3, and it was both meaningful and inspiring. As we gathered, we were reminded that December 6 is Lions Day in Claymont, a celebration we proudly mark each year with our Annual Claymont Christmas Parade, bringing joy and holiday spirit to our community.

We were honored to welcome Morgan Ikonne, Executive Director of Sojourner's Place, as our guest speaker for the evening. Morgan shared the powerful story and mission of Sojourner's Place, an organization that has been transforming lives in our community for

more than 36 years.

Founded by Sister Jeanne Cashman, Sojourner's Place was built on a simple but profound vision: to create a true *home* for individuals experiencing homelessness—one where residents are not rushed out, but instead are given the time, dignity, and support needed to rebuild their lives. Unlike short-term shelters, Sojourner's Place allows residents to stay as long as necessary while they work toward independence.

Since its founding, more than 3,000 individuals have “graduated” from Sojourner's Place, moving from homelessness to stability. Residents receive far more than a bed. Sojourner's Place provides:

- A safe, supportive living environment
- Three nutritious meals each day
- Hygiene products and personal care items
- A clothing closet, including professional attire for job interviews
- Life-skills training and workforce readiness support to help residents become employable and secure stable housing

Every donation helps restore hope, dignity, and opportunity for individuals working to reclaim their independence. Financial contributions, as well as in-kind donations, make a real and lasting difference.

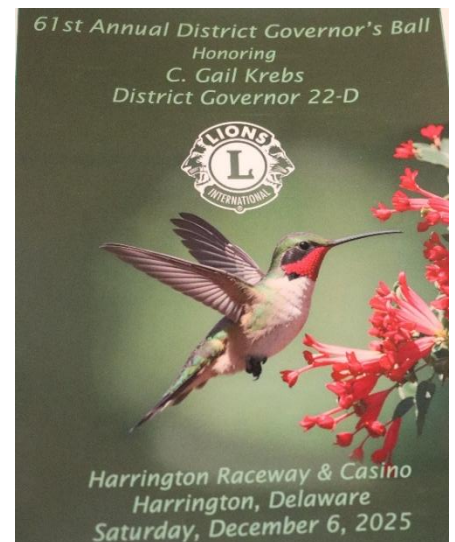
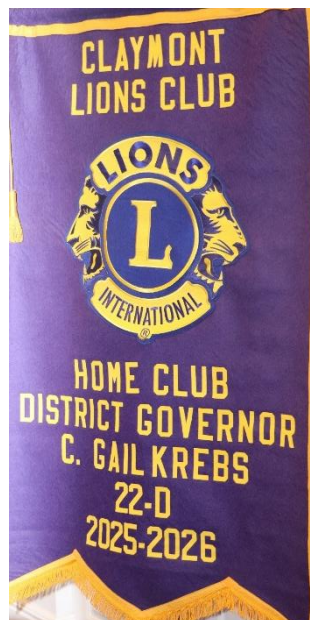
